

It's Showtime at the Torrance Public Library

The All Ages Summer Reading Program at Torrance Public Library

The 2019 All Ages Summer Reading Program, "It's Showtime at the Torrance Public Library," was held from June 17 through August 24. The program was a great success with 7,257 participants across four reading programs: Pre-Reader, Reader, Bookworm, and Library VIP. Participants were encouraged to self-select the program that best met their summer reading goals. The Library again offered an online participation option for those who might find it difficult to come into the Library.

The Bookworm program, with a higher 16-hour reading goal, was the most popular program demonstrating that many participants, including some of our younger readers, accepted the challenge to read more this summer. Fun incentive prizes also encouraged participation with Pre-Readers and Readers receiving a midway prize to encourage them to keep reading and all finishers receiving their choice of a special final prize and a certificate of completion. This year 3,075 participants completed the program!

During the ten-week Summer Reading Program the Library offered a total of 186 entertaining and informative programs inspired by the "showtime" theme and had a total of 6,704 attendees! Youth participated in story times, story and craft programs, LEGO parties, magic shows, puppet shows, movie screenings, science experiments and outrageous animal shows at the Library. Teens were treated to a fun after-hours program and a plethora of unique craft programs. Adult programs included live musicians, movie screenings, chocolate tasting, storytelling, screenwriting, salsa dancing, a murder mystery party, and a wide variety of craft projects. The Library's popular

Design-A-Bookmark contest had 238 entries from all ages.

This year the Library surveyed all program finishers and found there is much love for the Summer Reading Program. Parents and children enjoyed being able to participate together, youth reported the program helped them read more, and many enjoyed the fun activities and opportunities to learn more about their library. The All Ages Summer Reading Program would not be possible without the generous sponsorship of the Friends of the Torrance Public Library. Thank you to all the Friends for your tireless work to provide resources to support Summer Reading and our community!

While City Librarian, she promoted the Library for awards, recognition, advocacy, and being a presence on the state and national stage. The library received 2 awards from the California Library Association and Hillary received the award for Librarian of the Year.

During her nearly 20 years of service, she was been responsible for creating many positive changes to the Torrance Public Library system and made our world a better place. For example, she ran both the Renovation and ADA Projects at the 5 branch libraries. These large projects were completed on time, under budget.

Another accomplishment was the ExxonMobil Homework Center. The refinery wanted to donate \$80,000 to community organizations in celebration of their 80th anniversary. And because she had a vision and a plan, it was all given to the North Torrance Library.

Hillary was also responsible for the Branch Wireless Project--which brought high speed internet access to the libraries.

She has been a mentor and a leader; she encouraged and supported staff in pursuing their Master's in Library and Information Science degrees and proud of those who successfully promoted up or transferred to another library system.
